The Women's Club Movement, 1880-1920 Lima DAR, Quaere Club and WCTU

The March meeting of the Lima Historical Society will feature a presentation by Lima native, Colleen Plimpton, on the important contributions of 19th and 20th century women's organizations like Lima's Quaere Club and the local Ska-hase-ga-o chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), as well as the Womens' Christian Temperance Union.

American women in the 1800's initially found their voice in the struggle for abolition and suffrage. During the Industrial Revolution women secured more leisure time, and were increasingly allowed higher education. Though still without the vote by the end of the century many progressive women organized into groups which were instrumental in issues such as child labor law reformation, environmental protection, historical preservation, justice, temperance, and library creation.

"New" 1930's Gas Kitchen Stove at the Tennie Burton Museum

It is appropriate to the period of our museum kitchen and looks great. By the 1930's most people had switched to electric lights, leaving gas companies looking for new uses for their product. Demand grew quickly.

Lima's own Caccamise Moving Co. graciously transported the stove from Rochester for us. Thank you all.

YELLOW WASP SERIES - 2019:

GENESEE WESLEYAN SEMINARY AND GENESEE COLLEGE

The campus on the hill on College St. (now the home of Elim Bible Institute) has a long history of offering educational opportunities for both women and men, beginning with Genesee Wesleyan Seminary (GWS) which opened in 1831 as one of the first co-educational institutions in the country. The seminary put Lima on the map and earned our town a reputation as a nationally-recognized center of learning. After the co-educational Genesee College was added to the seminary on campus around 1850, the Lima campus became even more of an attraction, as students were drawn from across the country. Many prominent, forward thinking, and influential 19th and early 20th century people owed their formal education to GWS and/or Genesee College. This series will profile some of these "famous" individuals who were associated with the seminary or college—either as students or faculty. Suggestions are welcome.

Helen Pitts Douglass

Born in 1838 to the prominent Pitts family of Honeoye New York, Helen Pitts attended Genesee Wesleyan Seminary for her initial secondary education. Her father, Gideon Pitts was a friend of Frederick Douglass, and the large family home on the main street in Honeoye is said to have been a stop on the Underground Railroad.

An intellectual from a young age, Helen went on to graduate from Mary Lyon's Mount Holyoke Female Seminary (now



Mount Holyoke College) in 1859. She became an active champion of abolition and the women's suffrage movement, remaining devoted to worthy social causes throughout the rest of her life. After the Civil War she taught at Hampton Institute in Virginia, a school that provided education to postwar free blacks. Later moving to Washington DC, she helped publish a feminist newspaper, writing about women's rights, before taking a job as a clerk in the office of Frederick Douglass. She assisted him in his work and the writing of his autobiography *Life and Times of Frederick Douglass*. Helen (seated in photo) and Frederick married two years after the death of his first wife.

Elizabeth Cady Stanton became a good friend to Helen and Frederick, lending vocal moral support to them when they were maligned by many of their friends and even their families for their "mixed race" marriage. In turn, both Douglasses remained steadfast in their public support for the cause of women's rights and suffrage. When Frederick died in 1895, his eulogy was delivered by Susan B. Anthony. Helen died in 1903 at 65 years of age. She was buried next to her husband in Rochester.


