Jeremiah's Hunger The Roots of Irish Immigration: & Its Impact on Lima

Local writer and author, Elizabeth Osta, will give a ZOOM presentation on her book, *Jeremiah's Hunger*, concerning 19th century problems in Ireland that led to large scale emmigration from the Irish homeland. She will expand on personal details and anecdotes of her own Irish ancestors' immigration to and resettlement in Lima, along with so many others of their countrymen who came and found new homes and work in Lima during the mid to late 1800s.

When Jeremiah Buckley buries his baby sister and his mother in a hillside in County Cork in the midst of An Gorta Mor (the Great Hunger), his grief turns to rebellion and commitment to the land as he works to achieve a dream which will echo over the centuries and as far away as America. At the height of the Great Hunger of the 1840s, in the town of Ahadallane, north of

Cork City, Jeremiah joins in the fight for Ireland's freedom from British rule and learns firsthand the futility of violence. He watches and works as changes touch the land of his birth, his family, and his relationship with his lifelong friend Michael Riordan who disagrees with him about the path to freedom. Jeremiah's journey carries him into the bare heart of his homeland where he endures the evils borne of domination. His hunger isn't satisfied until he almost loses himself in his quest for land ownership and Ireland's nationhood.

Join us on Zoom for a snapshot of Irish immigration to America through a local Lima lens focused on the many Irish families who risked everything, came to our town, and became accomplished and contributing members of Lima society. Collected by DAR members, including Tennie Burton, who also served as Lima's first Historian, from as early as 1908 when the DAR group formed, they represent the original core of our present museum collections, some dating back as far as the American Revolution. Congratulations to the American Hotel

The American Hotel and owner Pat Reynolds recently received a Genesee Valley Rural Revitalization Grant given to only 7 significant historic village structures in the twelve counties of the Genesee Valley. It will provide funds to rehabilitate the front façade of the hotel, including repairs and refurbishment of the balcony, porch columns, steps, windows and door.

Projects at the Tennie Burton Museum

Plans are underway for refreshing the exterior of the museum in Spring 2022. We have contracted for repairs to the siding and windows, as well as overall prep and painting of the building using the current historic colors. We also need to upgrade the water line from Rochester St to the museum due to the installation of a new main line by the Village. We will be seeking grant monies and donations to help defray the costs.

Update on Downtown Mural Project

Plans are still moving forward on the large mural to be created on Rochester St. next summer (opening July 9th) as part of the *LivCo Walls Project*. 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Some of Lima's Irish Immigrants and Their Descendants

Immigrants from Ireland were relative "latecomers" to early Lima, in comparison to those hailing from other countries. Thomas Martin appears to have been the first Irish settler, arriving in 1834 from County Tipperary. James Egan, Michael Courneen, and John Brennan followed with their families within the next 5-6 years. Fertile agricultural land attracted many of these early settlers. By 1848, the small but growing Irish community was able to build the first Catholic church with contributions totaling \$350 and land donated by a non-Catholic named Tone Yorks. Just two years later, the parish built its first crude "warm-weather" school (replaced by a more substantial structure in 1856) to assure a quality education for their children.

Over the remainder of the 19th century, the number of Irish who fled their homeland to find work and homes here in Lima grew exponentially. Many were farmers, notably in the Lima-Livonia Center Rd vicinity southwest of town (names include McMann's, Tubbs, Corcorans, Dibbles, and Kellys). Some purchased small (2-acre) plots of land that they worked, while living and working in town; the area became known as "The Patch." There was abundant work in the village as domestics or laborers in the homes of the increasingly well to do homeowners or businesses of Lima; some worked at the Seminary on the hill. Many eventually built permanent homes in that southwest area of town.

Over time, these Irish immigrants and their descendants became prosperous farmers, opened grocery and dry goods stores, hotels and other businesses, became educators in Lima's schools, and held local government positions in town. It would be difficult to enumerate the numbers of prominent and well-known individuals of Irish descent who have contributed to the Lima community in the nearly 200 years since Thomas Martin first emigrated here. 
