#### Charleston (established by Ontario County in 1789) Becomes Lima (1808)

"In 1795, Charleston was considered the most flourishing place in the county, though there were only a few log houses and the road to the north was a muddy thoroughfare with no buildings north of the corner for nearly a mile.

Because of the confusion caused by another town in the state by the same name, by Act of Legislature in 1808, the name was changed from Charleston to Lima....Thus Lima, New York is the first town of that name to be settled in the United States. There are now six others..." (excerpt from *Lima 1788 - 1964: The Crossroads of Western New York*, p.12, by Mabel Jenks.

#### LIMA HISTORICAL SOCIETY MISSION STATEMENT

Lima Historical Society was founded to collect and preserve Lima's history, its architectural structures, and its culture to educate and inspire people today and tomorrow.

#### Painting the Tennie Burton Museum by President Michael Leavy

The prospect of painting our museum—alone—with all its architectural twists and turns could easily have become overwhelming, but there was to be none of that. In fact I approached it with a sense of privilege and anticipation at painting one of Rochester Street's *grand dames*. Numerous repairs had to be made, including replacing clapboards and installing some new sills along the north side. Next came power washing (thanks to Doug Morgan for use of his power washer), scraping, caulking, glazing, nailing, screwing, filling and sanding.

When all that was done, a coat of primer was applied to the whole structure. Folks walking by thought, approvingly, that we were painting the museum white. With all her acorn pendants sparkling in the morning light, one woman remarked, "It looks like a wedding cake!" But we had another color scheme in mind. We took the previous colors and stepped them back one shade lighter on the Historic Preservation Colors chart. The idea was to make the museum more visible through the armada of grand oaks standing guard on our lawn.

The main project began in earnest August 22 and was completed by mid October.. I would arrive each morning with a cup of coffee and donut from Kirkwood's. Although the day's work was planned, a thoughtful walk around the place was needed to check the progress. Having worked on the house over the years, I knew her nooks and crannies—her aches and pains—and applied each brush-full of paint with plodding affection. The house exudes a sense of history and small town life. As a painter, it was cool to work on things like a widow's walk and a cast iron horse step.



The shutters were picky. I paid a young man from Harper's Trailer Park to scrape them. I then glued, tapped and screwed them into shape. Thankfully, Brant Braeges brought his heavy-duty sprayer to paint them in two and a half hours.

I'd also like to thank Bill Ruth, Josh Belke and my brother Glenn for helping. Glenn showed up regularly to help me carry the heavy forty-foot ladder. The house received two coats—the second being a carefully brushed finish coat. Glenn made a good point while contemplating the finished project from the front lawn. He said, "Painting a house is a headache but paint gives you something siding never will." He was right. Tennie-Burton glowed in the somber hues of that autumn dusk. I'd like to thank the LHS for entrusting me with this great project.
