Whenever folks gathered near the crossroads that was to become Lima, tales must have been told. At the next general meeting of the Lima Historical Society on Tuesday, September 22nd, Ina Doyle, an old-fashioned story teller, will entertain us with a variety of stories from Seneca Iroquois, French, European, and British Isles traditions. These legends, folktales, tall tales, and personal stories were some of those likely to have been told around the campfires and fireplaces of early Lima settlers. In this way, the stories were preserved as they passed from generation to generation during long Lima winter evenings before television, radio and computers.

Please join us for an evening of fun and stories steeped in the past. The meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 22nd at 7:30 PM at the Lima Court House (next to the Town Hall) on East Main Street in Lima. The meeting is free and open to the public. Children are more than welcome. Plenty of parking available.

East Side/West Side ...all around the town A TOUR OF HISTORIC HOMES IN LIMA



Once again, the Lima Historical Society is hosting one of its always popular Historic House Tours as a fundraiser to help support the preservation of Lima's history at the Tennie Burton Museum. This year's event, entitled *East Side/West Side ...all around the town*, will be held on **Saturday, September 26th, from 11:00 AM** to **4:00 PM** (see enclosed flyer for tickets).

The tour will feature seven beautifully restored historic Lima buildings representing an unusual time span and range of architectural styles: from the 1793 Federal style John Morgan "Brick" Inn with spring-loaded dance floor; to two distinctive village homes (Greek Revival/Late Italianate), one of which is now a Bed and Breakfast; to a very ornate Queen Anne style rural home (see photo); to an early 20th century California Craftsman Style Bungalow; and finally to two Main Street buildings that have been exquisitely adapted for residential, commercial and office use.

An afternoon tea, Irish dancing, music, and a Dollhouse Exhibit are all included in the special advance member ticket prices (see flyer).

The house has been turned into four apartments and the outside returned to its original look with the removal of a wrap-around porch and the application of pleasing new colonial paint colors.

Lima Son: Battle of Little Big Horn

It was recently brought to our attention by Daniel Ryan of Rochester that his great uncle from Lima, Corporal Daniel "Phil" Ryan, died at the Battle of Little Big Horn in 1876 under the command of General Custer. This fact was authenticated by the National Park Service at the Little Big Horn National Monument.

A small bronze plaque on the Ryan family stone in St. Rose Cemetery commemorates the death of this 21 year old Lima boy from Heath-Markham Rd. in that unpopular early war.
