Children's Old Time Crafts Ice Cream Social

Sunday May 19th 2 to 4 PM Lima Town Hall

This Sunday afternoon family event will take place on May 19th (2-4 PM) on the fully accessible second floor of the Lima Town Hall, 7329 East Main St. The program will focus on the early days and historic architecture of Lima NY through photographic and video imagery. It will also include old time crafts and activities for the kids and an Ice Cream Social free for all.

Two continuously running slide shows—one showing many historic photos selected from the voluminous collections of Lima Historical Society's Tennie Burton Museum, as well as a well-researched talk on Lima's historic architecture (highlighting Lima's 59 structures on the National Register of Historic Places). The beautifully-restored historic video, "Positively Lima," will be shown promptly at 2:30 PM. Children's activities will be taking place throughout the afternoon, and the Ice Cream Social will occur at around 3 PM.

For those who are interested, there will be a second showing of "Positively Lima" allowing time for pauses to accommodate questions or comments about individuals or places in the video, and other recollections from the audience. We are hoping some of you with a long history in town will share in this exchange, so that we might better document our video. Please add to our history by telling us what you know.

For newcomers to Lima, this will be a great opportunity to meet neighbors and familiarize yourselves and your children with the more than 200-year history of the community in which you live. Those from other communities are of course welcome to join us for this Lima Historical Society event.

The Gillette Bottling Works

One of the most prominent and successful industries in early Lima was the Gillette Bottling Works established by Schuyler Gillette on Livingston Street in <u>1858</u>. He built a cider mill which yielded apple cider that was then fermented in large vats in the basement and bottled for sale as bubbly "champagne cider." Gillette's products were popular far beyond the local market, and were shipped to cities as far away as New York City.

Around the turn of the century, the company, probably then in the hands of his son, Erson Gillette, turned its emphasis to soft drinks such as sasparilla and ginger ale which required soft water. It was initially carried in tanks from Hemlock Lake. Later, they relied on rain water collected from the roof in a 250-gallon barrel cistern. (continued on Page 3)

Lima Connects to the World Number Please ????

For many children who visit, one of the most intriguing items in the Tennie Burton Museum is the old telephone switchboard located in a front room on the second floor. Little do they realize, given the presence of phones in their lives, that there were not always phones in everyone's home, hand, and pocket in Lima.

According to Mabel Jenks' *History of Lima: The Crossroads of Western New York*, 1964), the first switchboard (magneto-type) was installed by Bell Telephone Company in the old Salmon pharmacy building on East Main Street sometime around 1890. Callers had to come to the store and be assisted by the pharmacist's son, Harold—Lima's first operator. Later, a second phone was installed in the old Corner Store at the corner of College and Rochester Streets.

Because a growing number of Lima residents were installing home phones, creating increased demand for service, a second switchboard, similar to the one on the right was installed in the pharmacy. Soon a competitor to Bell Telephone installed a third switchboard on Rochester Street downtown, but eventually that company consolidated with Bell as Rochester Telephone Corporation in 1918.

For 50 years, the second floor of the Salmon (later Swartz) Pharmacy served as home to Lima's phone system with its three switchboards, eight regular operators, and an ever-increasing number of customers. Then on July 25th 1957, *the Lima Recorder* reported that "Lima Phones Will Be Cut Over From the Old Crank System to Modern Dial Next Wednesday (July 31) at 7 AM." The new dial service would accommodate more than 700 local customers and local calls could be made from home. Only long distance calls required going through an operator in

Honeoye Falls. Rochester Telephone built a small substation on the west side of Rochester Street adjacent to a two-story building that had formerly served as Lima's Town Hall and the Rev. John Copeland Ladies Academy. The shift to dial was touted as the latest in telephone technology. In a personal tribute, Mrs Clayton Powers, Lima night operator for 33 years, was celebrated for her service with a luncheon at the Avon Inn. (Honeoye Falls Times Aug 15, 1957).

In 1964, Mabel Jenks made the following prediction about the new dial system: "Probably in another fifty years, it will be superseded by equipment as radically

different as these two types are now" (Jenks, *History of Lima: The Crossroads of Western New York*, 1964), p. 46). She could never have imagined how right she was!

Then, it was filtered slowly down to the basement tile tank through a complex series of 23 filters. Carbonic acid gas was added to achieve the bubbly effect of the soft drinks. Gillette soft drinks gained huge popularity and success during the days of the growing Hemlock Lake resort community just down the road.

Schuyler Gillette had also invented a wooden bottle washing machine, the first of its kind, which was promoted by his son Erson, in partnership with five other Lima businessmen. They received a patent for the "washer," and this Lima-made machine was exhibited at a bottler's convention, advertised, and shipped to customers all over the world (Jenks, The *History of Lima* 1964; Democrat and Chronicle, Oct 5, 1941). We know that the two-story Gillette structure was purchased by the Mignon Transformer Company in 1941, at which time it was being used as a garage. When did the Gillette Company cease making soft drinks? Please contact us through our website if you have information to share.
